#### SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS AT KANSAS CITY ROYALS

#### TONIGHT'S GAME

- The Giants have advanced to the World Series for the third time in five seasons, the sixth time in SF-era history (since 1958), and for the 20th time in franchise history...the Giants' 20 World Series appearances surpass the St. Louis Cardinals for the most in the NL.

#### THE GIANTS

- Will be looking to become the second NL team to win three World Series in a five-year span (Cardinals - 1942, 1944, 1946).

#### WINNING WAYS IN POSTSEASON

- SF has won 15 of their last 17 postseason games, including seven of their last eight on the road...the Giants have not lost the first game of a postseason series on the road since dropping Game One of the Division Series at Florida on Sept. 30, 1997...since then, SF has gone 7-0 in postseason road openers (3-0 this season, including Wild Card game at PIT).

#### GIANTS IN THE FALL CLASSIC

- The New York Giants were 5-9 lifetime in 14 appearances in the World Series and the San Francisco Giants have gone 2-3 in five trips to the Fall Classic...the franchise's 53 World Series victories are the third-most all-time behind the Yankees (134) and Cardinals (58).

#### GIANTS THIRD IN WORLD SERIES GAMES PLAYED

- The Giants will play their 110th World Series game tonight...their 110 WS games are the third-most all-time behind the New York Yankees (225) and the St. Louis Cardinals (118).

#### WORLD SERIES OPENERS

- The Giants are 12-7 in World Series openers, going 5-3 on the road.

#### POSTSEASON SERIES WIN STREAK

- Not counting the Wild Card game, the Giants have won eight straight postseason series, the longest such streak in NL history and tied with the Yankees (1927-1941) for the second-longest streak ever, trailing only the 1998-2001 Yankees, who won 11 straight (*Elias*).

#### WILD CARD WORLD SERIES

- The 110th edition of Major League Baseball's championship series will pit two wild-card teams for the second time in baseball history...the Giants lost the other in seven games in 2002 to the Los Angeles Angels...the following teams have won the World Series as a Wild-Card team: Marlins (1997, 2003), Angels (2002), Red Sox (2004) and Cardinals (2011).

#### UNDER 90 WINS

- The Giants, who had an 88-74 record this regular season, will face the Royals, who posted an 89-73 mark this year...according to *Elias*, the combined regular-season winning percentage for the two teams (.546, 177-147) will be the second-lowest for any World Series, only one percentage point higher than the .545 (176-147) mark for the 1973 matchup of the Oakland A's (94-68) and New York Mets (82-79).

#### TWO TEAMS WITH LESS THAN 90 REGULAR SEASON WINS

- This World Series is the first in Major League history that two teams, each with fewer than 90 regular season wins, will meet in the Fall Classic, in an uninterrupted (non-strike, non-war shortened) season.

#### PABLO'S POSTSEASON ON-BASE STREAK REACHES 23

- **IF Pablo Sandoval** has reached base safely in 23-straight postseason games (dating back to Game Four of the NLDS on Oct. 10, 2012), the longest streak in Giants franchise history and tied with Lance Berkman and Lou Gehrig for the sixth-longest in Major League history...Sandoval leads the Giants in hits (14), runs (6), extra-base hits (4) and total bases (18) this postseason.

#### BOCHY HALL OF FAME-WORTHY?

- **Bruce Bochy** has now won four pennants as a manager, three with the Giants and one with the Padres...every other manager to have at least that many is in the Baseball Hall of Fame.

#### AT THE HELM

- Bochy is in his seventh postseason stint as a big league manager, his third in eight seasons with SF...he's 37-27 (.578) all-time in postseason play, including a 29-11 (.725) record with SF...he's 8-5 all-time in the World Series...the Giants have never lost a postseason series in Bochy's tenure...Bochy has won nine straight postseason rounds since 2010, the second-longest streak ever by a manager, trailing only Joe Torre's 11 straight with the Yankees from 1998-2001.

#### WINNER OF GAME ONE

- Winners of Game One have won 69 of the 109 World Series all-time (63.3%), including 15 of the last 17.

- The Giants and Royals are meeting in the World Series for the first time...SF is just 3-9 versus Kansas City since Inter-league Play began in 1997...the Giants are just 2-7 here at Kauffman Stadium and 1-2 at AT&T Park...both these teams faced one another this season from Aug. 8-10 here at the K and the Giants were swept in the three-game set, being outscored by a 16-6 margin.

#### THIS DATE IN GIANTS HISTORY

**October 21, 2012** - The Giants beat the Cardinals 6-1 in Game Six of the NLCS to force a Game Seven...**Ryan Vogelsong** outdueled Chris Carpenter by tossing 7.0 innings while allowing just one run on four hits with nine strikeouts...**Marco Scutaro** drove in a pair of runs and **Brandon Belt** went 2-for-4 with two runs scored.

**POSTSEASON**

- Was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2014 NLCS, becoming the first Giants pitcher to ever win the award, dating back to 1977 when it was first awarded... went 1-0 with a 1.72 ERA (3er, 15.2ip) in two starts against STL in the LCS.
- On his third postseason roster (also 2010, 2012), Bumgarner has gone 2-1 with a 1.42 ERA (5er, 31.2ip) in four starts this postseason...is 5-3 with a 2.76 ERA (20er, 65.1ip) in 11 postseason games (10 starts) in his career.
- With his start tonight he'll match **Christy Mathewson** (1905-1913) for the most starts by a Giants pitcher in franchise history...Bumgarner's five postseason wins are also tied with **Lincecum** and **Mathewson** for the most in Giants franchise history (since 1900).
- Has lasted at least 7.0 innings while allowing no more than three runs in five-straight postseason starts, tied for the second-longest in Giants postseason history (see chart on right).
- Enters tonight's outing with five consecutive postseason starts of 7.0 or more innings pitched and seven or fewer baserunners allowed, tying the Major League record set by Bob Gibson (1967-68) and Mike Mussina (1997-2001).
- Also enters tonight's outing with a postseason road scoreless streak of 26.2 innings, a Major League record... last allowed a run on the road in a postseason game in Game Four of the Division Series at Atlanta on Oct. 11, 2010 (Brian McCann solo home run in the 6th inning).
- Is 4-0 with a 0.59 ERA (2er, 30.2ip) and .159 opponents avg. against (17x107) in four postseason road starts, compared to 1-3 with a 4.67 ERA (18er, 34.2ip) and .262 avg. against (34x130) in six starts at home.
- Has issued just two walks or fewer in all 10 of his career postseason starts, tied with Gary Nolan (1970-76) for the fifth-longest streak in MLB history...Curt Schilling owns the record with 15 consecutive postseason games of two walks or fewer.

**2014 SEASON**

- Bumgarner's steady emergence as one of baseball's best pitchers makes him a Cy Young Award contender in 2014 after having the best season of his career, going 18-10 with a 2.98 ERA and 219 strikeouts, a record for a San Francisco left-handed pitcher.
- The 2014 All-Star posted career highs in wins, innings pitched and strikeouts, while fashioning the second-lowest ERA of his career for a full season.
- Among NL leaders, he finished tied for third in complete games, fourth in wins, fourth in innings pitched, fourth in strikeouts and 14th in ERA.
- The Giants went 20-13 in his outings (13-5 on the road and 7-8 at home).
- His 18 wins were the most by a SF pitcher since **Shawn Estes** had 19 in 1997.
- Became one of three left-handed pitchers in Giants history to record 15 or more wins in multiple seasons before turning age 26...joined **Rube Marquard** (1911-1913, 3) and **Cy Seymour** (1897-1898, 2).
- Was one of just five left-handed pitchers in Giants franchise history to record 200-or-more strikeouts in a season, joining **Cy Seymour** (239, 1898), **Rube Marquard** (237, 1911), **Ray Sadecki** (206, 1968) and **Jonathan Sanchez** (205, 2010)...his 219 strikeouts were the third-most by a Giants lefty behind Seymour and Marquard.
- Had six double-digit strikeout games, the second most in the NL behind Clayton Kershaw (7).
- Was one of the best pitchers on the road, going 11-4 with a 2.22 ERA (31er, 125.2ip) in 18 starts (3 CGs)...his 11 road victories matched Kershaw and Adam Wainwright for the most in the Majors while his road ERA ranked as the fourth-lowest in the NL.
- Was selected to his second consecutive All-Star team as he finished fourth on the player ballot, behind Johnny Cueto, Adam Wainwright and Clayton Kershaw... however, was not eligible to pitch because he started the Sunday prior to the break...he didn't pitch in the All-Star Game in 2013 either, as Bochy held him back for long relief.
- Averaged the second-most run support in the NL (behind COL's Jorge De La Rosa, 6.20), averaging 5.76 runs per game, the most he ever received in his career.
- Led the league with nine pickoffs and allowed just 7-of-17 runners to steal off him (41.2%), the fifth-lowest stolen base pct. in the NL.
- Was named the NL's Pitcher of the Month twice: May (5-0, 2.08 ERA, 48 Ks, 5 BBs) and August (4-1, 1.57 ERA, 56 Ks, 3 BBs).
- Was named the "Willie Mac" award winner, an annual honor bestowed upon the most inspirational player on the team, as voted upon by Giants players, coaches, training staff and the fans.

**Notes:** Is the top candidate among pitchers to receive a NL Silver Slugger award after leading all pitchers in batting average (.262), runs scored (10), hits (17), home runs (4), RBI (15) and slugging pct. (.477)...would be the first Giants pitcher to win this award since **Don Robinson** won it in 1990...Bumgarner's four home runs were the most by a Giants pitcher since **Hal Schumacher** hit six in 1937 and his 15 RBI matched **Juan Marichal's** 1966 San Francisco season record...two of his four home runs were grand slams, becoming the second pitcher in Major League history to hit two in one season...the only other pitcher with two in a season is Tony Cloninger, who did so against the Giants, hitting both in one game on July 3, 1966 (**Elias**)...prior to Bumgarner, the last pitcher to hit four home runs and drive in 15 RBI while earning at least 18 wins in a season was Hall of Famer Ferguson Jenkins in 1971 with the Cubs (24-13, 6 HRs, 20 RBI).

- His six postseason home runs are tied with **Rich Aurilia** for the second-most in Giants history (**Barry Bonds**, 8).
- Completed his seventh season with SF by hitting .279 with 26 doubles, 16 home runs and 73 RBI in a career-high 157 games.
- Hit over 100 points higher against right-handed pitchers (.317) than he did left-handed pitchers (.199)...his .317 average against right-handers was the fifth-highest among NL players, while his .199 clip against southpaws was the sixth-lowest in the league.
- Started a career-best 153 games (150 at third base and three as the designated hitter)...committed just 11 errors in 382 total chances at third base, tied for the second-fewest miscues of his career...his .971 fielding percentage ranked as the third-best among NL third basemen.
- Had a 73-game errorless streak from May 24-Aug. 22, the longest of his career and nearly three-quarters of the way to the Major League record of 99 consecutive error-free games at third base, held by Jeff Cirillo and John Wehner.
- Hit .173 (22x127) with two HRs and six RBI through his first 35 games (month and a half of the season), but hit .308 with 14 HRs and 67 RBI the rest of the way (122 games).
- Got his body in shape during the 2013-2014 offseason and lost nearly 30 pounds when spring training began...worked with trainer Rafael Alvarez, who helped keep Bobby Abreu in the Majors into his late 30s, and his brother, a chef, cooked his meals.
