A LOOK AT THE SUMMER

Battered and bruised near the end, Team USA (25-12) finished off a 37-game, 57-day summer in third place at the World Port Tournament. They also received a silver medal at the Pan American Games. Both time they were defeated by Cuba, who took home top honors at both tournaments. The Americans traveled through 16 cities, three continents (in a span of two weeks), and played 10 countries, from the mountains of Siberia in Russia to the rain forests of Brazil. The team met for the first time on June 19 and without trials, played that night and finished up a six-day New England swing at 5-1. They went on to play 10-straight days starting on June 29 against Chinese Taipei and Japan. They took four of five from Taipei, and lost 3-2 to Japan, for the first time on American soil in the annual collegiate series. Two of those losses were by a single run. They went on to the Pan Am Games in Brazil, fighting through weather delays and poor field conditions which saw the games delayed three times for the Americans, going a perfect 4-0 before losing to the Cubans 3-1. It was then back to the States, up the American Southeast, playing 48 hours later and four games (with three wins) over China, losing a fifth game after four innings due to rain, before having to play more four games in three days against the Netherlands and Russia. The Americans went 6-2 over that stretch. The team finished off the summer with eight games in 10 days in Rotterdam, going 4-2 before consecutive losses to first place Cuba and second place Taipei.

BATTERED BUT NOT OUT AT THE END

The Americans fought through injuries at the end. Two starters were injured-- Logan Forsythe (foot) out for the last half of the World Port Tourney, and 3B Pedro Alvarez (arm) limited to DH duties, while threestarting pitchers (Jacob Thompson, Lance Lynn, Brian Matusz) had to be replaced due to over use, but no injury, prior to the start of the tournament.

Danny Espinosa (Long Beach State) ended the summer on an eight-game hit streak, while Jordan Danks (Texas) ended it on a seven-game streak... Brett Hunter (Pepperdine) did not allow a run from June 23 until the final day, August 11.

AWARDS/LEADERS FOR THE SUMMER

Pedro Alvarez (Vanderbilt) was named the American MVP for the Japan-USA series in early July and was named All-World Port Tournament to close out the summer. Alvarez led the Pan American Games in RBIs (7). Alvarez finished second at the World Port in homers (3) and in RBIs (7)... **Jordan Danks (Texas)** was named the Rookie of the World Port Tournament after batting .419 in Rotterdam. That average was fourth-best while his on-base percentage was tops (.500) amongst the five teams. Danks also led the Pan American Games in runs scored (7)... **Logan Forsythe (Arkansas)** led the Pan American Games in hitting (.625)... **Roger Kieschnick (Texas Tech)** was fourth at the Pan Am Games in batting (.425). ... **Jordy Mercer (Oklahoma State)** had the 10th-best average at the World Port Tournament at .333... **Tyson Ross (California)** was second at the Pan Am Games in strikeouts (10) and had the fourth lowest ERA amongst starters at the World Port Tourney (0.64)... **Ryan Berry (Rice)** had the third lowest ERA amongst pitchers in Rotterdam with an 0.61 ERA... **Brett Hunter (Pepperdine)** had the third lowest batting average against amongst the five teams at the World Port (.130) and the best strikeout to innings ratio (16.20). Hunter's 12 strikeouts were fourth

BIG TIME HITS FOR THE SUMMER

Logan Forsythe (Arkansas) had the only hit, the game-winner with two outs in the ninth, to beat Japan 1-0 to start the World Port Tournament... Pedro Alvarez (Vanderbilt) had the game-tying double in the ninth to win the rubber game of a three-game series with the Netherlands at the end of July... Tommy Medica (Santa Clara) hit his first home run of the summer July 8, over the Durham Bull, against Japan... Roger Kieschnick (Texas Tech) hit an RBI single in the eighth and the game-winning two-run home run in the ninth against Taipei on June 30... on July 29, he hit the game-winning single in the ninth to beat the Netherlands... Logan Forsythe (Arkansas) had the game-winning two-run single in the fifth of a 2-1 win over Mexico, after getting two hits in the first game of the doubleheader that day, sending the Americans into the Gold Medal game the next day... Scott Gorgen (UC Irvine), a late edition to the team, after striking out eight Russians in his first start, struck out 10 in a World Port loss to the Cubans, giving up three runs (one earned) on six hits over six innings... Cody Satterwhite (Ole Miss) saved both ends of the doubleheader at the Pan Am Games, sending Team USA into the Finals... Mike Minor (Vanderbilt) struck out twelve over six shutout innings over China, allowing just four hits... Brian Matusz (San Diego) went 6.1 innings for the win over Mexico, allowing just one run on three hits over Mexico to win the Pan Am Semi-final game... Lance Lynn (Ole Miss) struck out 10 Taiwanese over six innings, retiring the first nine in a row, five by strikeout on July 1... Tyson Ross (California) struck out seven Dominicans in a win at the Pan Am Games, and then struck out three Cubans in relief in the Gold Medal Game... Ross was also perfect through five and had a no hitter into the sixth against the Netherlands on July 28.

A LOOK AT THE TEAM

Team USA will feature a 20-man roster for the Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and a 22-man roster of collegiate Division-I freshmen and sophomores overall for the summer of 57 days and 37-game schedule. Two members of last year's team, 3B Pedro Alvarez (Vanderbilt) and OF Roger Kieschnick (Texas Tech) returned to the team for their second stint. Alvarez led the team last year in batting at .379 with a .647 slugging percentage and team-best 43 RBIs. Kieschnick was fourth on the team with a .290 average with 14 RBIs, starting 17 of the 41 games. The team met for the first time on June 19 in New England and played that same night.

ALL-AMERICAN TEAM

The roster features six All-Americans in: Pedro Alvarez (a two-time first team selection), Smoak, Wallace, RHPs Thompson, Ryan Berry (Rice) and Brian Matusz (San Diego), and LHP Josh Romanski (San Diego). Berry was the 2007 National Freshman of the Year, while Wallace was the Pac-10 Player of the Year as a sophomore.

FROM OMAHA TO TEAM USA

Three members of the 20-man roster will head from the College World Series in Omaha to Team USA. They are Arizona State's 1B Brett Wallace and C Petey Paramore and Rice's freshman RHP and national freshman pitcher of the year, Ryan Berry. Berry joined on June 26, Wallace and Paramore joined on June 24.

NEW TRAINING CENTER

On June 19, the new home for USA Baseball opened in Cary, NC. The first game at the new facility was a part of the Tournament of Stars that same day. Total construction costs were just over \$11 million and paid for from Wake County taxes and the town of Cary. The Thomas Brooks Park is on 221 acres, which includes four baseball fields (a stadium and three practice fields), all with dimensions of 330 down the lines and 400 to center. The stadium's capacity is 1754, with 250 overflow seating.

MIKE WEATHERS

HEAD COACH | LONG BEACH STATE

Record: 504-411-2 (17 years)

at LBSU 225-131 (6 years)

This will be Weathers' third tour with USA Baseball, as Weathers was an assistant for Team USA in 2003 when the U.S. won a silver medal at the Pan American Games behind future Golden Spikes Award winner, and former LBSU pitcher, Jered Weaver. Weathers was chosen to represent the U.S. at the World Games in South America in 1970. Weathers has coached the Dirtbags to five NCAA Regionals and two Super Regionals, producing 39 professional players and eight first or second round selections. Has over 500 wins to his credit, he has been a head coach at Utah and Chapman College in Orange County and was an assistant for LBSU from 1993 to 2001. During his tenure as a head coach at LBSU, the Dirtbags have had six national team players, six conference players of the year and coached 12 All-Americans. Along with Weaver, first round pick Evan Longoria was a Golden Spikes Award Finalist in 2006. Weathers is the second LBSU coach to have a tenure with Team USA. Former Coach Dave Snow was an assistant on the 1992 Olympic team, and was also an assistant during the summers of 1995 and 1996.

ASSISTANTS ON TEAM USA

ROB COOPER | WRIGHT STATE HC

Cooper finished his third season at Wright State, guiding the Raiders to 94 wins. In 2006, WSU reached the NCA Regional in Corvallis, falling to the eventual national champions. Cooper's previous international experience was the USA Junior Team in 2000. The former University of Miami player spent 12 seasons as an assistant at Oral Roberts, Tulane, Wake Forest, Miami and Sacramento City College. During his coaching career he has been a part of five NCAA Tournament teams and two College World Series appearances.

BILL KINNEBERG | UTAH

Kinneberg, a 21-year coaching veteran, has set school records for victories at three stops during his career, UTEP (1985), Wyoming (1990) and Utah (1996). Kinneberg's international experience extends to director of Team USA's Athlete Develop Program the early part of this decade and as the pitching coach for the U.S. National Team in 1999 and the Italian Olympic team in 2004. Kinneberg just finished his fourth year as the head coach at Utah and has 346 victories over 12 years as a head coach. From 1996 to 2001, he was the associate head coach at Arizona, following a one-year stint as the head coach at Utah in 1996. Kinneberg spent seven years as the Head Coach at Wyoming and the 1985 season at UTEP. He was also an assistant at Arizona State from 1992 to 1994, helping the Sun Devils to two CWS appearances in 1993 and 1994.

MARK SCALF | N. CAROLINA-WILMINGTON

Scalf finished up his 16th year as the head coach at his alma mater, UNC Wilmington, producing four-straight 40-win seasons from 2003 to 2006. Previous international experience includes a 2003 stint with Team USA, with Weathers and then-Head Coach Ray Tanner. In 21 years associated with the program, Scalf has recruited 63 all-conference players and three conference players of the year. A total of 44 players have signed professional contracts. He has won 512 games and has nine straight winning seasons, culminating in three of the last five NCAA Regionals.

SO WHAT IS THE NATIONAL TEAM?

The USA Baseball National Team consists

of the top collegiate baseball players in the country, and the 2006 National Team captured the gold medal at the FISU (International Sports Federation) World Championship with an 18-9 win over Chinese Taipei in Havana, Cuba. It marked the first-ever tournament championship win for the USA Baseball National Team in Cuba. The USA Baseball National Team performs each summer in a schedule of exhibition games across America and overseas against the world's top baseball talent. They also take on the Japanese Collegiate All-Stars in an annual five-game series – and have never lost the series on American soil. Among the many players who have worn the red, white and blue for the National Team are Nomar Garciaparra, Ryan Howard, Jason Varitek, Huston Street, Todd Helton, Troy Glaus, Tino Martinez, Bobby Crosby and Jered Weaver.

GOLDEN SPIKES AWARD

For the last 29 years, USA Baseball has honored the top amateur baseball player in the country with the Golden Spikes Award. The award is sponsored by Major League Baseball and presented each year to the player that exhibits exceptional on-field ability and exemplary sportsmanship. Last year, University of Washington righthander Tim Lincecum won the prestigious award. Past winners include Alex Gordon, Khalil Greene, J.D. Drew, Jason Varitek, Mark Prior, Mark

Kotsay and Jason Jennings.

NEW ENGLAND TOUR (5-1)

The Red, White and Blue finished off their first road trip with a 5-1 record, losing just once, at Torrington, CT for the second-straight year.
